As Chair of the CESAR Scheme and the CEA Board, I am delighted to introduce this report which details the current activities and progress of the Scheme.

I have been associated with the CESAR Scheme since it's beginning well over ten years ago. We have seen industry dynamics continuously change since then.

The Scheme has evolved over time to combat the increasing threat from both domestic regional crime to that of international organised crime. Techhological advancements are being more widely adopted by organised and professional criminals, and as such we need to combat this with our own technology. I am pleased to report that the level of sophistication within the Scheme has increased significantly along with the support activities that are rendered to recover and prevent theft.

Recently we have witnessed a rise in the level of activities of equipment theft. This is not only linked to regional activity but the demand for construction and agricultural equipment in Eastern Europe. Some of this has been driven by the current conflict in Ukraine, the sanctions imposed on Russia, and the lack of availability of equipment locally. Throughout all our activities it should be remembered that the cost of equipment theft. Lastly, my sincere thanks to the large number of officers and police staff across the UK that are committed to being part of a UK wide Police team tackling machinery theft.





UK Regional Forces Supported









- 31/01/24 NCATT co-ordinated deployment of officers in Yorkshire to recover stolen motorhome. Vehicle seized and four persons arrested.






Headline Stats - Arrests

February 2024

- 02/02/24 NCATT Ports Operation with NAVCIS at Birkenhead identified a vehicle at the port was
 a cloned stolen vehicle. Ferry held, boarded and one male arrested (male is OCG nominal). The
 Toyota Hilux was identified as stolen from Sussex two days earlier.
- 05/02/24 NCATT assisted with warrant alongside Cheshire and Derbyshire regarding stolen Range Rover. Two persons arrested.
- **05/02/24** NCATT following enquiries on eBay in relation to stolen Leica equipment for sale, co-ordinated deployment of officers in Surrey. One male arrested and *300* + *power tools* seized at suspect's address.
- 06/02/24 NCATT investigation of vehicle involved in plant thefts resulted in vehicle being intercepted and one male arrested. Stolen trailer and stolen excavator recovered.
- **06/02/24** NCATT deployed following request from Leicestershire Police. Property identified selling stolen Honda 90 ATV, location attended, and ATV found under tarpaulin. One suspect arrested.
- **19/02/24** NCATT deployed to South Wales following ram raid/burglary at rural car dealership. All four vehicles recovered, and two suspects arrested.
- 24/02/24 NCATT co-ordinated officers in Essex to assist CanTrack to recover a stolen Avant telehandler in yard.
 One male arrested. Machine and a stolen Land Rover Discovery seized.





Headline Stats - Arrests

March 2024

- 11/03/24 NCATT works on tracking unit heading south from Doncaster in conjunction with OPAL, vehicle heads to Harwich and is stopped by NAVCIS. Vehicle contains eight machines, six JCB 16C stolen from Euro Auctions, one Wacker Neuson, and one Bomag roller stolen from two sites in South Yorkshire. One arrested and lorry seized, vehicle bound for Poland.
- 13/03/24 NCATT attended address in Essex in relation to the theft of 53 pieces of plant.
 Two suspects arrested. One for money laundering and one for theft and money laundering.
 Over £100k in cash seized from the address along with 100 VIN plates from plant machinery, luxury items and financial documentation.
- 20/03/24 NCATT supported West Mercia with seven males arrests and searches for OCG involved in Agri and plant thefts, illegal firearm located. Six have been charged with conspiracy to commit burglary and conspiracy to steal. All Six were remanded. The seventh was arrested on suspicion of conspiracy to commit burglary and was released on police bail pending further enquiries.
- 26/03/24 NCATT attended warrant with Dorset Police and in conjunction Hampshire Police regarding a suspected handler
 of stolen vehicles and plant. One male arrested at home address, warrant executed at three properties, over 100 vehicles
 and five items of plant machinery checked. Parts found from two stolen vehicles Ford Transit and a Jaguar F Pace. A cloned
 stolen Volkswagen Passat was also seized.

CESAR Scheme Marks Milestone at LAMMA Show with Kawasaki's Adoption and 625,000th Machine Protected

The Equipment Theft (Prevention) Bill would allow the secretary of state to make regulations to deter the theft of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs). This government-supported private member's bill has passed its stages in the House of Commons and is awaiting second reading in the House of Lords.

The purpose of the Equipment Theft (Prevention) Bill is to prevent the theft of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) such as quad bikes. The bill would allow the secretary of state to make regulations requiring immobilisers and forensic marking to be fitted as standard to all new ATVs. It would also provide for the secretary of state to make regulations on recording ATV sales. This could include a requirement to register ATV sales on a specific database. In addition, the bill would enable the extension of these powers to other equipment designed or adapted primarily for use in agricultural or commercial settings, such as the construction sector. The bill would extend to England and Wales.

The theft of ATVs is a problem for the agricultural sector, with the government estimating that 900 to 1,200 quad bikes and ATVs are stolen in England and Wales each year. The lack of security features that many manufacturers install in ATVs, as well as recent supply issues, have been making them increasingly desirable for thieves. The insurer NFU Mutual has labelled ATVs "hot ticket items". The theft of tools and other equipment has also been highlighted as an issue for sectors such as construction.

Equipment theft can affect victims in various ways, including through financial loss and emotional and mental health costs. For example, NFU Mutual estimated that thefts of quad bikes and ATVs cost their customers £2.2mn in 2021. In addition, Direct Line reported that more than £46mn worth of tools were reported as stolen from vehicles in the UK in the six months to April 2021.

There is currently no legal requirement for manufacturers to fit immobilisers or add forensic marking to the machinery and equipment which would be covered by the bill. Some manufacturers and owners do fit security
